



Following in the Footsteps of Christ Origin of Stations of the Cross

Originally known as the *Via Crucis*, it is translated to The Way of the Cross or The Way of Sorrows. It refers to a series of images depicting Jesus on the day of His crucifixion along with accompanying prayers. The stations grew out of imitations of *Via Dolorosa* (the actual route believed to have been taken by Jesus through Jerusalem to Mount Calvary). The earliest use of the word "stations" came from the reference of accustomed halting-places in the *Via Sacra* ("Sacred Street") in Jerusalem. It was used in the narrative of an English pilgrim named William Wey who had visited the Holy Land in the mid-15th century and later described pilgrims following the footsteps of Christ to the cross.

The object of the Stations is to help the Christian faithful to make a spiritual pilgrimage through contemplation of the Passion of Christ. It has become one of the most popular types of devotion and the stations are found in the Roman Catholic Church as well as the Anglican, Lutheran, and Methodist churches.

A series of 14 images are arranged in numbered order. The faithful move from image to image, in order, stopping at each station to say prayers and reflections. The prayers are not said to the image but rather the image reminds us of the particular steps of Christ's passion. This can be done individually—or with others—most commonly during Lent. Stations of the Cross on Good Friday are done especially in a spirit of reparation for the sufferings and insults that Jesus endured during His passion.

St. Mary—Mio has Stations both inside the sanctuary and outside on the Shrine grounds. Stations of the Cross will be held each Friday of Lent at 6pm.

#### Your CSA contributions at work this week:

On Ash Wednesday, some of the CSA money that has already been collected will be sent to help rebuild the Church in Central and Eastern Europe as well as the ex-Soviet Union. The focus is on training seminarians and lay leaders, supporting social service programs, youth ministry, pastoral and catechetical centers, schools, church construction and renovation, and evangelization through Catholic media.

On the First Sunday in Lent, some of the CSA money that has already been collected will be distributed as grants to various dioceses throughout the United States to be used to support and strengthen the Church's concern for the Black and Indian Missions. Mandated by the III Plenary Council in 1884, this program is 125-years-old and without this support, would no longer exist.
