Vigil mass - Oct. 31st at 6 pm (no morning mass) and Nov. 1st, All Saints Day is a Holy Day of Obligation.



Oh, Lord, it's Hard to be Humble

Some folks may remember the fun song from the 70's, *"Oh Lord, It's Hard to Be Humble,"* by Mac Davis. Every verse is full of sarcasm about a person infatuated with himself.

Oh Lord, it's hard to be humble, When you're perfect in every way. We laugh about the vanity and pride, but to be honest, we may recognize the impulse in ourselves, to be prideful.

I can't wait to look in the mirror Cause I get better looking each day. The thoughts in the song are not all that different from the Pharisee's prayer in today's Gospel. Note that Jesus specifies that the Pharisee "spoke this prayer to himself," It could be that the Pharisee prayed silently, but it could also be that the Pharisee had fallen so deeply into pridefulness that he all but demands that God agree with his selfjudgment, usurping the authority and knowledge of the Almighty ... and making a fool of himself in the process.

Who cares? I never get lonesome Cause I treasure my own company.

Compare those lines to the life of the sinful tax collector. Tax collectors could seize as much as they wanted and pass along only what was owed, which gave them a legal right to steal from others. They were bitterly despised, and being outcasts, they would have had to spend their time with other outcasts.

It was not the religious Pharisee who approached the Lord humbly, but the lowly and despicable tax collector. Jesus tells those gathered that the tax collector knew and acknowledged his sinfulness—and he offered them up in shame to the Lord.

The lesson, Jesus says, is that "whoever exalts himself will be humbled, and the one who humbles himself will be exalted." Jesus means this moral as a warning, not of God's wrath, but of our own folly. The Lord does not inflict humiliation on the prideful; they inflict it upon themselves. The Pharisee in this parable is blinded by his own selfdeception and has no room for faith and trust in God. All fall short of the glory of God, so all need to rely on the Lord's mercy. When we understand that then we will see each other as sisters and brothers, all of us in need of love and mercy. The last lines of the song's refrain are:

Oh Lord, it's hard to be humble. But I'm doing the best that I can. We're far from perfect, and with that in mind, and faith in the Lord's love for us, we all can do the best that we can.
